### Small Group Questions

1. Has your understanding of what worship is changed at all over the years? If so, in what ways?
2. Who is the "worship leader?" Is there only one? If more, are they all musicians? Is worship ultimately a gathered musical experience? Explain your answer.
3. From our passage – Colossians 1:15-20, Joe questioned who or what is central to our worship. What is the "substance" of our worship? While the text focuses on Jesus Christ, should He or the Father or the Holy Spirit receive the most of our attention?
4. Joe taught that this text refutes three avoidable errors: (1) that Christ is seen as less than He is; (2) that Christ is able to do less than He is able to do; and (3) that in worship, Christ is less important than He is.
5. In light of the text, how does Jesus Christ make it possible for us to really know God?
6. How might the idea that worship involves both "revelation" and "response" help formulate true worship?
7. What might be causing many to struggle with the "worship experience" of the church? What can those who don't "struggle" with it do to help change the experience for those who do?
8. If God is central to our worship, what do you believe needs to change in your worship of Him?
